Sharps Trivia



Activity is appropriate for grades 3-5 and grades 6-8

How to Run Trivia

Option 1: Using dry-erase boards

- Materials needed: dry-erase boards, dry-erase markers
- Instructions:
 - o Optional: make a slide show with each question and correct answer on a different slide
 - Have students group into teams and give each team a dry-erase board and marker
 - You can have teams come up with a team name
 - o If you wish to keep score you can make a scoreboard and use the team names
 - Read out the question (while showing the question slide if applicable)
 - Teams have 10-20 seconds to quietly discuss and write their answer on their dry-erase board
 - Call out "boards up" to have teams lift their boards to show their answer
 - When all boards are up, say the answer (and advance to the answer slide if applicable)
 - Mark the points on the scoreboard if keeping score

Option 2: Kahoot

- Materials needed: Laptop or computer, projector and screen, tablets or devices for each student or groups of students
- Instructions:
 - o Prepare the trivia questions ahead of time by going to www.kahoot.com
 - Sign up for a Kahoot account
 - Enter all the questions and answers to create the game. You can preview the game, and when you are finish, select "Done"
 - When you are ready to play, you can find the game under the "Kahoots" tab. Click play and select your options. A game PIN will be generated
 - o Project your screen for the class to see
 - Have students use their devices to go to <u>www.kahoot.it</u> and enter the game PIN. Press start once everyone is logged in
 - o You are ready to play!

Option 3: Quiz format

- Materials needed: Pencils/pens, paper
- Instructions:
 - Have students ready with a piece of paper and pencil or pen
 - Read out the questions
 - Have students write the question number and answer individually on their paper
 - Once all questions are done, have students trade papers with another student to mark
